#### What is the BSEA?

- Administrative law body
- Three functions:
  - Mediations
  - Hearings
  - Settlement conferences
- People:
  - Mediators
  - Hearing officers
  - Director



#### Mediations

- Possible mediation cases:
  - Not getting services in student's IEP
  - Disagreement over what services should go into an IEP
  - Placement disagreement
  - Compensatory education
- When a mediation might help:
  - School's position is obviously ridiculous
  - School might work with you
  - There is room for compromise
- How to request a mediation:
  - Call the BSEA: 781-397-4750



#### Mediations

- How to prepare:
  - Write down what you want
  - Write down what you might be willing to compromise on and what you are not willing to compromise on
  - Gather evidence:
    - evaluations
    - incident reports, report cards, other school records
    - your and your student's experience
  - Prepare an opening statement
- What to expect: shuttle mediation



## Hearings

- Types of Cases: You want something and the district said no
  - Not getting services in the student's IEP
  - Disagreement over what services should be included in a student's IEP
  - Placement disagreement
  - Compensatory education
  - Manifestation determination review appeal
  - Eligibility disagreement

- Timelines:
  - Expedited: 15 days
    - MDR appeal
    - District says someone is going to get hurt
  - Accelerated: 30 days
    - Health or safety endangered
    - Services are so inadequate that student is harmed
    - Student has no program or program is about to end
  - Regular: 35 days, but can be postponed



## Hearings: Gathering Evidence

- Independent or outside evaluations
- School records: (10 days to get them to you)
  - Report cards
  - IEP progress reports
  - Attendance
  - School discipline and restraint, if relevant
  - Conduct logs
  - Notes from OT, PT, etc. providers
  - Remote learning records
- Notes from outside providers
- Your notes from remote learning



## When to Call for Help

- First, try:
  - Ask for an IEP meeting and at the meeting, ask for what you want
  - Follow-up put your ask in writing
  - Request school records

  - Full representation
